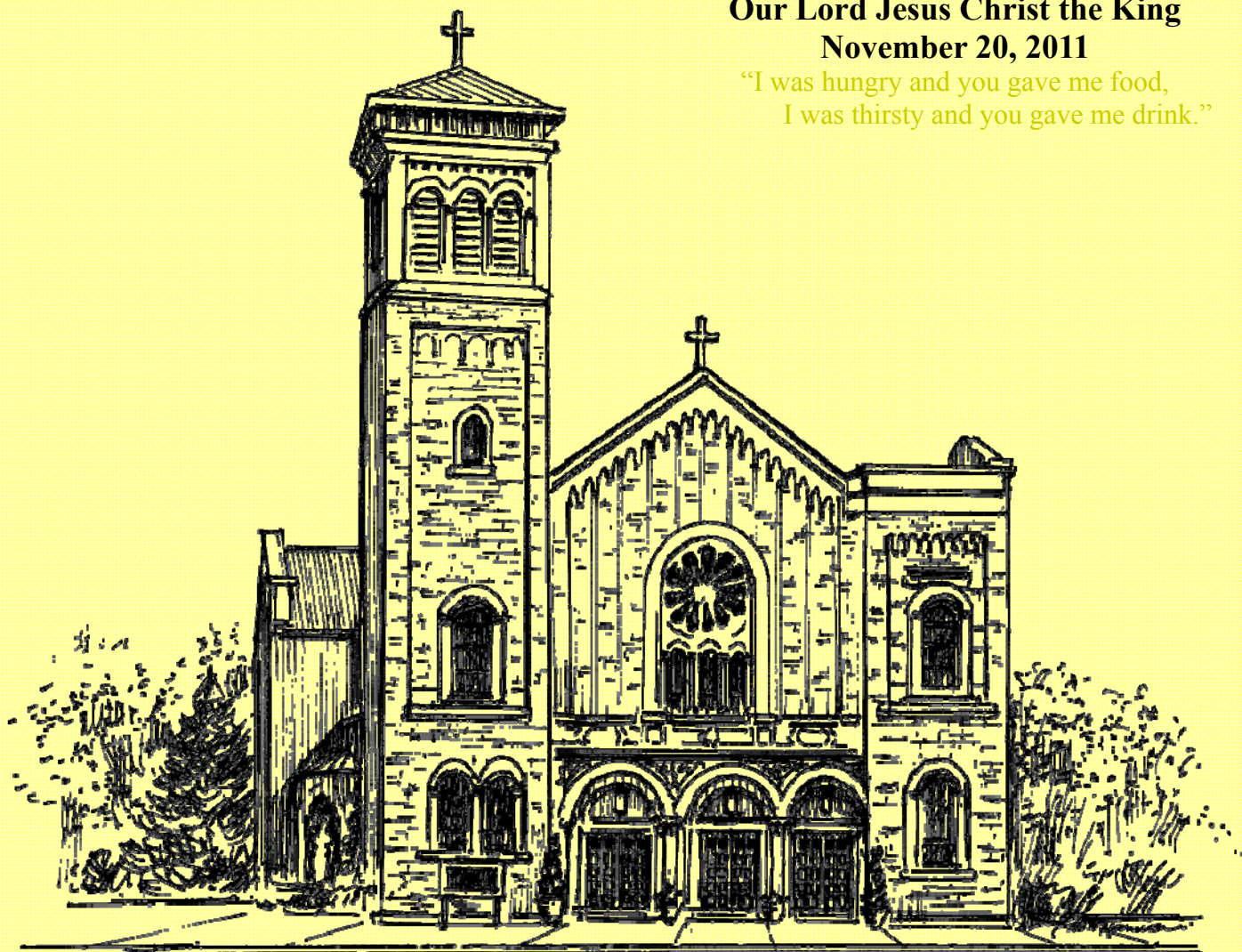

Dear Brothers and Sisters:

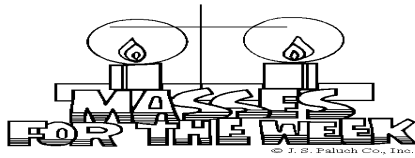
Today's solemnity of Christ the King ends the liturgical year and comes to remind us of the Second Coming of Jesus Christ. The season of Advent also has this as its purpose. Jesus does not come by force, but as a shepherd. He is looking for those who have gone astray due to sin, to laziness or the distractions of the world and he comes to forgive us, and save us. He comes to build a kingdom of truth, love and peace, especially inside us. Each one of us is called to be part of this kingdom here on earth, and then in heaven. We want him to reign over every aspect of our hearts and our actions, not only what we do on Sundays. His Coming will wipe away every tear and sadness.

Whatever we do for a little one we do for Jesus Christ. Whatever we do for the least of our brothers or sisters we do for him. The Gospel is reminding us of the corporal works of mercy that we are called to live (feed the poor, give drink to the thirsty, cloth the naked, visit the sick and those in prison and bury the dead). The kingdom of God is a call to service, a call to give our lives for those around us; it is much more than dropping off food for the food pantry, important as that is.

At this time of year the Church is reminding us that when we see God face to face we will need to give an account of our lives and what we did for those close to us, or those in need. The smallest action that we do for others is not missed by God who sees everything in our lives.

This feast of Christ the King shows us that everything is subject to God and that he is the Lord of life and death. Jesus Christ has the last word over death and destroys it so that we do not need to be afraid. We can overcome our fear of death at the end of our lives and also of the ontological death that kills us everyday: what will happen to me if I get sick, or if I don't have enough money or if I am not accepted by others. An adult Christian faith gives us the possibility of rising above these deaths and fears and invites us to live in freedom.

As this year ends and Advent begins in another week, let us call upon the Virgin Mary to help us to be humble and to be the servants that Jesus Christ is calling us to be.

Pope Benedict VI's reflection on Psalm 23.

Dear brothers and sisters,

God is the way, the right path that leads us to life (cf. John 14:6); the light that illumines the dark valley and conquers our every fear (cf. John 1:9; 8:12; 9:5; 12:46). He is the generous host who welcomes us and saves us from our enemies, preparing for us the table of His body and His blood (cf. Matthew 26:26-29; Mark 14:22-25; Luke 22:19-20), and that definitive table in Heaven's messianic banquet (cf. Luke 14:15ff; Revelation 3:20; 19:9). He is the regal Shepherd, the King of meekness and of pardon, enthroned on the glorious wood of the Cross (cf. John 3:13-15; 12:32; 17:4-5).

Dear brothers and sisters, Psalm 23 invites us to renew our trust in God, by abandoning ourselves totally into His hands. With faith, let us therefore ask the Lord to grant us -- along the difficult roads of our times as well -- to walk always on His paths as a docile and obedient flock. [Let us ask] that He welcome us into His home, to His table, and that He lead us to "still waters", so that in receiving the gift of His Spirit, we may drink from His springs, from the fount of that living water "welling up to eternal life" (John 4:14; cf. 7:37-39).

KNEELING FOR THE LAMB OF GOD

The Church in the US calls for us to kneel during the Lamb of God rather than stand so that we worship in the same way in all our churches. We will begin this change on the First Sunday of Advent, November 27th, when we start to use the new translations for the prayers of the Mass.

THANKSGIVING & THE EUCHARIST

In light of the upcoming Thanksgiving holiday it might be worthwhile to see the connections between Thanksgiving and the Eucharist. In the early Church the Eucharist was seen primarily as a song of thanksgiving, a response to the actions of God in salvation history. This intervention of God is the history of the Jews and our history as well. It is no mere idea, it is a historical fact. It is something that can be experienced, and has been experienced throughout history and by us.

The appearance of God in our lives through the sacraments or the preaching or the events of life immediately creates a meaning for us. To such an extent that God appears as in the life of Abraham and sets him out on his journey. God appears through Moses and after 400 years of slavery the way to freedom is opened, through the sea and into the desert. God appears and life suddenly has a meaning, a horizon opens up in front of us and happiness appears. That is why when God appears, eternity enters into time and everything has a meaning. We see this in all conversion experiences. When we have a true experience of God in our lives we recover our senses. We rejoice and give thanks.

This appearance of God in our life immediately causes in us a response. This reply to what God is doing in our lives is the essence of the Eucharist. Maybe we never learned this in our catechesis as a young person and this is what the Second Vatican Council of the Church is trying to restore. The Eucharist or the Mass is a song sung in thanksgiving to God; it is a response, an explosion of grace, of thanksgiving to God for what he has done. As it was for the Jews it is a Passover. We have an experience of overcoming death or slavery or fear and we praise God for this.

The word Eucharist to our minds explains what is in the tabernacle - the bread. However, this is only a small part of what the Eucharist represents. The word Eucharist in its true origins in the primitive church is something different. The Eucharist was above all a celebration, a response, an exultation, a proclamation of what God has done for us, as the Jews still do every Passover. The first Eucharist was a Passover celebration where Jesus Christ changes the meaning slightly from the exultation of freedom from the slavery of Egypt to the joy of his triumph over the slavery of sin, his triumph over death.

The heart of the Eucharist is this exultation, this happiness, this celebration of incredible joy. Jesus Christ is victorious; he does not die, and neither do we! The joy which is the heart of the Eucharist makes it above all a confession of God's work, of what he has done for us. Each one of us should experience it in a different way. The Eucharist is a song of joy, a proclamation; it is more than an act of thanksgiving. Thanksgiving is not big enough to explain the Eucharist. It includes the act of giving thanks; but it goes further and praises God and proclaims his greatness. The Eucharist, then, is a response, a confession, a thanksgiving for his Word which is an action that we see in our lives. It is something sacred. It would be ashamed to experience the Eucharist as a duty, as something boring.

Let us give thanks to God for all He has done in our lives by celebrating this Thanksgiving Day with the Eucharist, which is our way of thanking God and proclaiming his goodness and his love for us.
